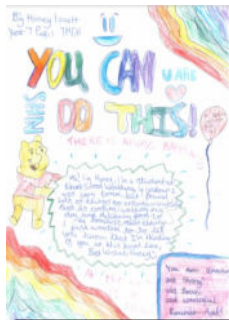
The Student Council -

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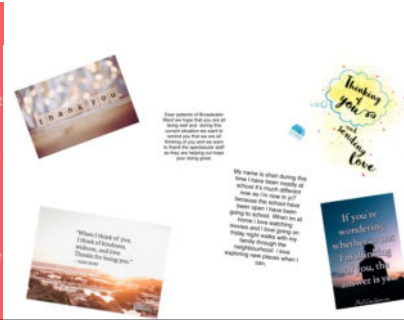

In November all Tutor Groups took part in the Make Your Mark campaign run by the West Sussex Youth Cabinet. As part of the campaign students voted on the issues that mattered to them most at both a national and local level. The issues which gained the most votes will then be presented to MP's by the West Sussex Youth Cabinet. In 2019 the school's high voter turnout rate led to BSW being awarded the Gold Democracy Award and we are aiming for the same this year! Our students clearly enjoyed participating in the campaign; Jamie Busson 9JFO, "as we aren't old enough to vote in elections it is good to be able to have a say on the national issues which matter most to us". Evie Moeller 9JTO, "it's great to be able to choose how to improve our local area and give our views on how funding should be spent".

Votes For Schools:

Votes For Schools became a regular Tutor Time activity last term and each week students examine a topical, cultural or political issue and cast a vote on which side of the issue's main viewpoints they most agree with. Topics students have examined in the Autumn term have included human rights, ways to diversify the curriculum and the impact of social media on young people's wellbeing. Cara Plassing 8DHU; "I like Votes For Schools because I get to learn more about issues in the news and then decide my own view. It is also interesting to compare how our school voted compared to other schools in the country".

During the first lockdown and the Autumn term all students have completed ImpactEd surveys as a way of collecting information about their learning and wellbeing experiences, achievements and concerns. Mr Cordwell who is leading the initiative explains, "the surveys were originally designed to give us an insight into student wellbeing during lockdown and students' motivation towards remote learning during this period. This term the surveys compare how students are doing now they are back at school. Then we can review the data and use it to help support students who may be struggling and put them in touch with a Tutor / member of the pastoral team". We will also shortly be launching a system for tutors to stay in touch with their tutees on a regular basis. Eadie McCarthy 9HPE; "it's nice that the school is checking on our views of our progress and how our behaviour and motivation affects it".



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During the last two weeks of the Autumn term all Tutor Groups have been completing a Student Voice survey designed by the Student Council in which pupils can give their opinions on what the school is doing well and what we could do to further improve BSW for our wonderful students. Positive comments from students included; “I think the response to Covid 19 is really planned well”, “when you need help or are struggling, there is always someone here to help you”. “The iPads really help and make it easier to learn” and “there is an array of clubs to do, good lessons and nice teachers”.

Areas for development suggested were; “placing more of the outside benches under the canopies so they aren’t wet on rainy days”, “publicising all of the different mental health support available for students on a regular basis” and “increasing the number of bins in the Atrium and front playground”.

Emma Hill 11FPO; “it has been great to read so many positive comments and thoughtful suggestions from students for how the school could be further improved and I look forward to working with the Senior Leadership Team to make these changes happen!”
